# GOVERNOR'S PROJECT

## Governor's Project

As many of you know, this year's Governor's Project is entitled Reaching Out, Changing Lives and is focused on encouraging clubs to identify and reach out to shut-ins in their communities. Once a shut-in (or two, or three, or four...) has been identified, clubs are encouraged to plan and carry out small group visits to their respective shut-ins on a monthly basis for at least 4 visits totaling 6 hours. (Don't let that stop you from continuing to reach out in your community, though!) However, there are two questions that I have been frequently asked regarding the Governor's Project – how does a club go about identifying these shut-ins and what can you do on your visits?

To begin with, there are several ways that clubs can go about deciding who they want to visit. The first way is to ask around at a local nursing home to see which patients maybe don't get that many visitors. You could then make a point of visiting these people with the nursing home's permission. Another option that I encourage every club to consider is to ask around amongst your club members. Often times, as in my personal case, people will have neighbors, friends, or even friend-of-friends that are in need of a little cheering up through visits. Another option would be to ask around at local churches or organizations in your community that deal with the elderly. Ultimately, it is about finding those that need someone.

As far as what to do on these visits goes, keep your playbook wide open. You can do just about anything you can think of! The people you visit will be more than happy to play cards with you (if they are able), play a board game with you if you teach them as you go along, or even just chat over a nice coffee. They'll also really appreciate it if you offer to help them out with things that maybe just need to get done, or things they can't do themselves. This can be everything from moving some stuff around in their garage for them to taking their dog for a walk. Just treat the people you visit the way you would your friends or other Key Clubbers and you'll be good to go!

When December came around, 35 of the clubs' members rode a Charter bus to Green Bay hospitals to visit patients, sing carols, and pass out candy canes, cards, and blankets in hope of keeping them warm throughout their stay.

As one of the members who participates in this project every year, this was something new we decided to try, and it was one of the most fun experiences I've had with the project. The members loved it, along with the hospitals and the patients we visited. Not only did we see how happy we made people, we had some laughs and some tears too. You should never miss out on your chance to do something big just because of the cost. The YOF is there to help us, and it's quick and easy to apply.
